## As To Zion's Altar "STATUES"

# **Questions:**

- 1. Who are the FIVE Figures from left to right?
- 2. What is ONE of the Figures doing different from the other FOUR?
- 3. What are FOUR of the Figures holding that ONE is not holding?
- 4. Let's start with JESUS. What is His Figure telling us? John 3:17.
- 5. Let's move to <u>John</u> and his Gospel, <u>the last written</u> but one that begins *before* earthly "time" began. Proverbs 8.
  Starts in "eternity" ("in the beginning"); "disciple whom Jesus loved" (an "Alfred Hitchcock type"); the "I Am passages; "spirituality" (ex. "deep enough to drown an elephant..."); John makes the *love* of JESUS part everyday life in the midst of <u>deep theological concepts</u> (targets <u>early</u> Christians); JESUS = Word
  Prophet. +
- 6. We now move on to Luke.

Gospel of (1) women & children, (2) songs & prayers, (3) universality (Pauline emphasis); and (4) the Holy Spirit; earliest historical starting-point (research: 1:1-4); chronological; a favorite word: "compassion" (also an "Alfred Hitchcock type"); JESUS = Priest & Savior (forgiveness).

7. Next, Matthew demands our attention.

A "numbers" man (another "Alfred Hitchcock type")! Matthew targets <u>Jews</u> as his intended audience (this is shown by his reverence for the OT by repeatedly quoting OT <u>fulfilled</u>

<u>Messianic prophecies</u>, as well as the clever way in which he introduces the <u>new Torah Era</u>). (Matthew repeatedly quotes <u>fulfilled Messianic prophecies</u>); <u>JESUS</u> ends Matthew's Gospel by speaking <u>about</u> the END of this worldly era; <u>JESUS = King.</u> +

8. Finally, we meet Mark.

Speed: "<u>immediately</u>"/Roman audience (a final "Alfred Hitchcock type"); Petrine emphasis; <a href="JESUS">JESUS</a> = Action Prophet. +

9. Only two [2] miracles are repeated in <u>all</u> Four Gospels! What are they?
