Lectionary Year B begins this week, highlighting readings from Mark and John. The year begins with the season of Advent.

### **A Colorful Complement**

Color, like music, plays an important role in worship. Liturgical color complements the message of the seasons during the church year and aids in establishing a climate in which Law and Gospel may be heard.

However, color can easily be taken for granted or mistaken in its purpose. The paraments, vestments, altar clothes and banners must be seen as more than decoration.

- Blue, used at <u>Advent</u>, communicates the message of hope, Our Christian faith
  rests on the hope that Christ, who came in history assuming our flesh, will return
  on the last day from that same blue sky into which He ascended long ago.
- Green, is used during the seasons of <u>Epiphany</u> and Pentecost. It is appointed color for <u>Epiphany's</u> message of Christ's revelation to the gentiles and growing His kingdom through missions. Green is the color of growth. The Sundays following Pentecost emphasize our need to grow and mature as disciples of Jesus Christ.
- The calendar calls for black only twice: on <u>Good Friday</u> and <u>Ash Wednesday</u>.
   There's no mistaking the message that this sober color gives. Black is the absence of light. These are times for reflection on the cost of our redemption.
- Gold is the optional color for <u>Easter</u> Sunday. It is also suggested for the last Sunday of the church year – Christ the King Sunday. It represents value and growth. The Resurrection of Jesus Christ gives our lives meaning and worth.
- Scarlet is called for during the <u>Holy Week</u>, from <u>Palm Sunday</u> to <u>Maundy</u> <u>Thursday</u>. It is associated with the passion – the color of blood.
- Purple, like black, is a penitential color. It is used during the <u>Lent</u> and, in many parishes, during <u>Advent</u>. This deep rich color represents somberness, penitence and prayer.
- White is the color of purity and completeness. Used primarily during the 50 days
  of <u>Easter</u>, it bears the message that "though yours sins be as scarlet, they shall
  be white as snow." His purity before His Father becomes our purity.
- White is also used for <u>Christmas</u> and its 12 days, <u>Epiphany</u> and the first Sunday following it, Transfiguration Sunday and Holy Trinity Sunday.
- Red is a power color. It is appropriate for <u>Pentecost</u> Sunday when we remember the power and fire of "the Lord and Giver of Life," who reveal Himself as the Promised One.

# Hymn of the Day LSB 332 TLH 95 "Savior of the nations, come"

Scripture References: st. 1-3 = Luke 1:26-45 st. 4 = Phil. 2:6-11"As attested by Augustine in 372, as well as by other early writers, **Ambrose** wrote this hymn in Latin ("Veni, Redemptor gentium") in the fourth century. The text appears in a number of eighth- and ninth-century manuscripts. Martin Luther (b. Eisleben, Saxony, Germany, 1483; d. Eisleben, 1546) translated this text into German ("Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland") in 1523 and included it in the Erfurt Enchiridia (1524). Consequently "Savior of the Nations" has become possibly the best known of the Lutheran Advent hymns... Stanzas 1-3 explain in hymn form what the Apostles' Creed confesses: he was "conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary" (see also Luke 1:26-45). Stanza 4 alludes to Philippians 2:6-11, which speaks of Christ's humiliation and exaltation. Stanza 5 is a prayer for faithfulness, and stanza 6 is a plea that Christ continue to intercede for his people. Stanza 7, a doxology, points to Christ's second coming and the coming of his eternal "lasting kingdom." ...

Ambrose (b. Treves, Germany, 340; d. Milan, Italy, 397), one of the great Latin church fathers, is remembered ... for ... his introduction of metrical and antiphonal singing into the Western church.... The influence of Martin Luther was ...important in the worship and music of the church...

Luther also became involved in the reformation of the worship of the church. It is generally recognized that in his liturgy Luther remained much closer to the Roman Catholic Church than did Calvin. However, both his Latin Mass ("Formula missae," 1523) and German Mass ("Deutscher messe," 1526) incorporated the basic teachings of the Reformation and became the model of worship for later Lutheran (and other) churches. Luther also promoted congregational singing ...Luther was a fine singer and lute player, and his love of music influenced the Lutheran tradition....


