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Series – Part 17: How to Live as a Christian:

Acknowledge the Lord's Control!

James 4:13-17 NAS

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ, what are YOUR plans this week? <u>Today</u>: lunch, family, taking it easy; <u>M-F</u>: the grind of getting up, eating, working, sleeping.

- Do YOU have the ability to make those things happen?
- What if we lose our electricity for 24 hours?
- What if we are injured or sick to the point where we are hospitalized?
- What if we have another day like 9/11/2001?

<u>This is the point</u>: We *can* and *should* plan, but we really don't know what is coming in the future; therefore, the LORD is calling us to acknowledge His control over our lives.

Can WE Really Make It Happen? Come now, you who say, "Today or tomorrow, we shall go to such and such a city, and spend a year there and engage in business and make a profit." // James wrote about what we "say," which comes from our heart. Jesus said: The mouth speaks from that which fills the heart (Luke 6:45). Therefore, those who SAY or BRAG that they will •go to a certain place, •do a certain thing, and •benefit in a certain way are either unaware of or

not acknowledging the LORD's control. Even Solomon wrote: "Do not boast about tomorrow, for you do not know what a day may bring forth" (Pro 27:1 NAS).

- 2. Do We REALLY Know About Tomorrow? Yet you do not know what your life will be like tomorrow. You are just a vapor that appears for a little while and then vanishes away. // Our lives on earth may seem long, but they are super-short like a vapor in comparison to eternity! But what about tomorrow, that should be easy enough to figure out; yet James wrote: "...you do not know what your life will be like tomorrow." Is that true? Yes!
 - a. <u>My life years ago</u>: My work routine followed a regular schedule of *what I did* and *when I did it*. Then, one day, as I drove back from Michigan, I memorized James 4:14. As I did so I believed what it said, but I really did not take it to heart. As I drove I thought my regular routine would continue for at least two more years, but, when I arrived at my destination, I was shocked to learn about some very significant changes in my life!
 - b. <u>Last Wednesday and last Friday</u>: A letter arrived and a phone call was answered; both have added even more *to my plate that was already full*.
- How SHOULD Believers Proceed? Instead, you ought to say, "If the Lord wills, we shall live and also do this or that." // That type of statement is proper: It does express our plans, but it also acknowledges that

the follow through is up to the LORD! Here are some Bible examples:

- a. <u>We pray in the Lord's Prayer</u>: "<u>Thy will be done</u>, on earth as it is in heaven" (Mat 6:10 NAS).
- b. Jesus prayed in Gethsemane: "My Father, if this cannot pass unless I drink it [referring to Jesus' death on the cross to remove our sins], your will be done" (Mat 26:42 ESV).
- c. <u>Paul wrote to the believers in Rome</u>: "...without ceasing I mention you always in my prayers, asking that somehow <u>by God's will</u> I may now at last succeed in coming to you" (Rom 1:9-10 ESV).
- d. <u>Peter wrote about God's will</u>: "...it is better to suffer for doing good, <u>if that should be God's</u> will, than for doing evil" (1 Peter 3:17 ESV).
- e. Paul made this statement about God: "In him we live and move and have our being…" (Acts 17:28 ESV) That implies that without God ⁽²⁾/₍₂₎ we do not live, ⁽²⁾/₍₂₎ we do not move, and ⁽²⁾/₍₂₎ we do not exist!
- 4. Let Us CHANGE: ¹⁶ But as it is, you boast in your arrogance; all such boasting is evil. // Arrogance says: "I can do it without God, regardless of God, in spite of God! Thinking or saying such things are even more than wrong, they are evil!
- 5. Let Us DO RIGHT: ¹⁷ Therefore, to one who knows *the* right thing to do, and does not do it, to him it is sin. // So boasting about tomorrow is sin, but here, in general

- a. We should acknowledge the LORD's control over all things (Lam. 3:37-38)!
- b. We should prayerfully seek His will in every circumstance!
- c. We should take action to do whatever is right in every circumstance!

Conclusion: The LORD is the Almighty God; He created; then, when the time was right, He stepped into this world to remove our sins and open heaven. Therefore, no matter <u>how</u> OR <u>how much</u> we have fallen short of His will, we – by grace through faith – have His forgiveness!

Therefore, let us +be sorry for our sins, +gladly acknowledge Him in every circumstance, +trust Him in every way, and +live unto His glory every day!

And all God's people said: Amen!

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
