Are YOU a Simeon or a Herod?

Introduction: Dear friends: What do you think about Jesus? That's a good question to ask others — to begin a spiritual conversation AND to find out if the person is a Simeon or a Herod, one who wants to embrace Jesus or one who wants to kill Jesus!

Last week we remembered Jesus' birth; **today** we focus on a unique encounter at the temple when He was 40 days old.

1. Mary's Purification: ²² And when the time came for their purification according to the Law of Moses, [Joseph and Mary] brought [Jesus] up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord ²³ (as it is written in the Law of the Lord, "Every male who first opens the womb shall be called holy to the Lord") 24 and to offer a sacrifice according to what is said in the Law of the Lord, "a pair of turtledoves, or two young pigeons." // As commanded in Leviticus 12, a woman bearing a son was to wait 40 days; then bring the required sacrifice – a year old lamb **and** a pigeon or a turtledove – to the tent / temple. For those who could not afford a lamb, they were to bring two pigeons **or** two turtledoves. Since Joseph and Mary brought the lesser sacrifice, we know they had **not yet** received the gift of gold from the wise men; I will mention that later.

2. Simeon:

- a. The man: 25 Now there was a man in Jerusalem, whose name was Simeon, and this man was righteous and devout [God-fearing], waiting for the consolation [comfort] of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. // Simeon believed God's OT promises, so he was waiting for the first coming of the Messiah even as we believe and are waiting for Jesus' second coming!
- b. The revelation: ²⁶ And it had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ. // Simeon must have been excitedly watching for the Promised Christ to appear, since he was told he would see the Messiah before he died!
- c. The encounter with Jesus: ²⁷ And he came in the Spirit [quided by the Spirit] into the temple, and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him according to the custom of the Law, ²⁸ he took him up in his arms and blessed God and said, ²⁹ "Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in peace, according to your word: 30 for my eyes have seen your salvation 31 that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, 32 a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel." // Those words spoken by Simeon are what we call the Nunc Dimittis, which means Now Dismiss – and the first two words in the Greek! For Simeon he saw the Christ, so he was ready to depart, to die in peace. For us – in the Supper – we receive the

- actual body and blood of the Christ, so we are ready to depart, to die in peace!
- d. The encounter with Joseph and Mary: ³³ And his father and his mother marveled at what was said about him. ³⁴ And Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, "Behold, this child is appointed for the fall and rising of many in Israel, and for a sign that is opposed ³⁵ (and a sword will pierce through your own soul also), so that thoughts from many hearts may be revealed." // "Based on their reaction to Jesus, people will either stand or fall (cf 1 Peter 2:6, 8)" (TLSB). Those who are like Simeon who looked forward to the Christ and embraced Him, they will rise! But for everyone else, they will fall:
 - i. For the Herod-like people who want to kill Jesus, *they will fall*.
 - ii. For those who deny that Jesus is the Son of God, they will fall.
 - iii. For those who kindly reject Jesus, they will fall.
 - iv. For those who pretend to know Jesus, *they* will fall.
 - v. For those who try to add to Jesus' saving work, they will fall.

So let us be like Simeon – looking forward to the Christ and embracing Him when He comes!

3. **Anna**:

a. The woman: ³⁶ And there was a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was advanced in years, having lived Page 3 of 4

with her husband seven years from when she was a virgin, ³⁷ and then as a widow until she was eighty-four. She did not depart from the temple, worshiping with fasting and prayer night and day. // So Anna was very devoted to the LORD and, considering the information given, was probably very close to the LORD for 60+ years – worshiping, fasting, and praying day and night! She was a bit different in comparison to most or all 21st century believers, but a good model for us as we move into 2018!

b. The proclamation of Jesus: ³⁸ And coming up at that very hour she began to give thanks to God and to speak of him to all who were waiting for the redemption of Jerusalem. // Since the people sinned, God promised the Savior; so when Anna saw the Savior, she thanked God for keeping His promise; let us be thankful too!

Conclusion: ³⁹ And when they had performed everything according to the Law of the Lord, they returned into Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. ⁴⁰ And the child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom. And the favor of God was upon him. // Luke got right to the point, so he told about the return to Nazareth; however, based on Matthew and Luke, this is the order: Birth in Bethlehem > at the Temple at 40 days > return to Bethlehem > wise men visit/bring gifts > flee to Egypt to escape Herod's soldiers > return to Nazareth.

<u>Let us pray</u>: Dear Holy Spirit, as You guided Simeon and Anna to Jesus, so keep us trusting in Jesus until He comes again!

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
