Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43 NIV

Wheat (repentant) and Weeds (unrepentant) Intertwined Now, Separated Later!

Sunday, July 20 at 9:00 + Monday, July 21 at 7 PM 6th Sunday after Pentecost / 5th Sunday after Trinity - 2014

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ:

Last week we said that parables have two levels of meaning:

- A **basic** meaning that is <u>earthly</u>, <u>physical</u>, and <u>temporal</u>.
- A deeper meaning that is <u>heavenly</u>, <u>spiritual</u>, and <u>eternal</u>.

Then we focused on the parable of the sower, which ultimately points to → God's Word being given and → the condition of the various hearts which receive it:

- Some are **hard** so the Word has no effect!
- Some are **shallow** so they believe a while, then fall away!
- Some are **thorn-infested** they love riches more than Jesus!
- Some, by God's grace, are **good** they gladly receive God's Word, believe in Jesus as their Savior, and live for Jesus!

Today we focus on the parable of the weeds (a.k.a. the wheat and the tares), which points to \rightarrow Christian congregations today and \rightarrow the separation that will occur when Jesus returns!

- 1. The Parable of the Weeds: Spoken to the crowds (v. 34):

 24 Jesus told them another parable:
 - a. <u>The Situation</u>: "The kingdom of heaven is like <u>a</u> man who sowed good seed in his field. ²⁵ But while everyone was sleeping, <u>his enemy came</u> and sowed weeds among the wheat, and went

- **away.** // Since the seeds were sown at the same time, *the roots became intertwined!*
- b. The result: ²⁶ When the wheat sprouted and formed heads, then the weeds also appeared. ²⁷ The owner's servants came to him and said, 'Sir, didn't you sow good seed in your field? Where then did the weeds come from?' ²⁸ 'An enemy did this,' he replied. // Picture the field: It's not 95% wheat and 5% weeds; it's more like 50, 50 → an enemy has done this on purpose!
- c. The response: The servants asked him, 'Do you want us to go and pull them up?' 29 'No,' he answered, 'because while you are pulling the weeds, you may root up the wheat with them.

 30 Let both grow together until the harvest. At that time I will tell the harvesters: First collect the weeds and tie them in bundles to be burned; then gather the wheat and bring it into my barn." // Again, if the roots are intertwined, pulling one may also pull the other; therefore, it is best to patiently wait for the harvest when both kinds will be pulled and separated!

In between the parable of the weeds and the explanation,

Jesus told two more parables (vv. 31-33): ◆Of the mustard

seed and ◆of the leaven! Even though a mustard seed is very

small and leaven seems very insignificant, over time the seed

can grow very large and the leaven can make a huge difference!

The same is true for God's kingdom – seemingly small and

minor, yet growing and major in every person who is →sorry

for his/her sins and →trusting in Jesus as his/her only Savior!

2. The Parable of the Weeds – *Explained*: ³⁶ Then he left the crowd and went into the house. His disciples came

to him and said, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds in the field." ³⁷ He answered,

- a. The meaning of each person and each component:
 - i. "The one who sowed the good seed is the Son of Man." That is Jesus, God's Son, who lived and died for you and me!
 - ii. ³⁸ "The field is the world…" That includes every nation, no place is left out!
 - iii. "...the good seed stands for the sons of the kingdom." Those are the people who ©are sorry for their sins, ©believe in Jesus as their only Savior, and ©do desire God's reign over their hearts and lives!
 - iv. "The weeds are the sons of the evil one..."

 Those are the people who ③are not sorry for their sins, ⑤do not believe in Jesus as their only Savior, or ⑤do not desire God's reign over their hearts and lives!
 - v. ³⁹ "...the enemy who sows them is the devil."

 He wants every person to doubt God's Word;

 he is the one who tempted Adam and Eve;

 he is the one who brought great affliction upon Job; and

 he is the one who prowls about like a roaring lion seeking to devour every Christian!
 - vi. "The harvest is the end of the age..." When God created, time began; when Adam and Eve fell into sin, we entered our present evil age; when Jesus returns, He will bring our present evil age to an end!

vii. "...the harvesters are angels." When Jesus comes, the angels will "separate the wicked from the righteous..." (Mat 13:49 NIV)

b. The ultimate meaning of the parable:

- i. ⁴⁰ "As the weeds are pulled up and burned in the fire, so it will be at the end of the age. ⁴¹ The Son of Man will send out his angels, and they will weed out of his kingdom everything that causes sin and all who do evil. ⁴² They will throw them into the fiery furnace, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth." // Since we all fall into sin, who are those people who will be super-sad forevermore? They are the unrepentant − □who have little or no interest in God's Word, □who are not sorry for their sins, and □who are trusting in their own goodness for heaven ⁽³⁾!
- ii. ⁴³ "Then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father." //
 When Jesus comes, those who know Him will truly shine! But what about now? From our own perspective everyone *does some good and *commits some sin, so who really makes the difference? JESUS! Unrepentant sinners (no sorrow, no faith) are lost, but repentant sinners (sorrow, faith) will be saved!

Conclusion: Finally, Jesus said: 43b "He who has ears [to hear], let him hear." And all God's people said: Amen!
