Galatians 3:1-14 ESV

## How Is a Person Saved – by Doing Good or by Believing in Jesus?

Let's forget about our thoughts and our feelings; what does the Bible say?

Introduction: Dear friends in Christ: Now we live, one day we will die; then what? Eternal joy or eternal torment! Most people agree on their desire for eternal joy, but many are confused about the way to eternal joy. According to our human reason it makes sense that God would welcome only those who do good; however, Jesus said: "No one is good except God..." (Mk 10:18). Since that is true, God promised to save the world through His Son; then He did it!

A short time later, God opened the eyes of Paul to see His saving truth, so Paul wrote: "...we know that a person is **not** justified by works of the law **but** <u>through faith in Jesus</u> <u>Christ</u>... [Then Paul added:] ...if righteousness were through the law, then Christ died for no purpose." (Gal 2:16, 21 ESV) But we know His death had a purpose – to remove our sins!

Since we must be justified, people try to justify themselves:

- By emphasizing the good they have done.
- By rejecting responsibility for their sins.
- By denying the reality of sin.

<u>But what is the problem?</u> "...a person is **not** justified by works of the law **but** <u>through faith in Jesus Christ</u>..."

About 500 years ago God opened the eyes of Martin Luther to see that we are justified by faith, not by works! So \*the

Bible, ◆Paul, and ◆Martin say we are saved *by faith alone*. We now go further into that topic by focusing on Galatians 3:

- 1. Paul Appeals to the Experience of the Galatians:
  <sup>1</sup> O foolish Galatians! Who has bewitched you? It was before your eyes that Jesus Christ was publicly portrayed as crucified. // Paul was shocked that the Galatians would even consider a return to their works for their salvation, so he said: Who has cast a spell on you? He also reminded them of how he had pictured Jesus as the Christ, who was crucified to save us!
  - a. <sup>2</sup> Let me ask you only this: Did you receive the Spirit by works of the law or by hearing with faith? // He wants them to think back to their conversion; it was NOT by works, BUT by faith!
  - b. <sup>3</sup> Are you so foolish? Having begun by the Spirit, are you now being perfected by the flesh? // God does MUCH MORE than start us down the right path; He ◆makes us sorry, ◆unites us to Jesus, and ◆keeps feeding us through the Word!
  - c. <sup>4</sup> Did you suffer so many things in vain-- if indeed it was in vain? // The Galatians, like many Christians, were persecuted; they chose to suffer rather than reject Jesus because they knew He was their Savior! But if they turned away, their suffering would be for nothing!
  - d. <sup>5</sup> Does he who supplies the Spirit to you and works miracles among you do so by works of the law, or by hearing with faith— // So they had the Spirit and miracles had taken place; was that because of their works? *By no means!*

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## 2. Paul Brings Scriptural Proof for His Position:

- a. <sup>6</sup> ...Abraham "believed God, and it was counted to him as righteousness" [Gen. 16:6]? <sup>7</sup> Know then that it is those of faith who are the sons of Abraham. // The teaching of Jesus and Paul, that we are saved by faith, was not new; 2,000 years earlier Abraham was counted righteous by faith, not by works! So what about us? We are also counted righteous by faith!
- b. 8 And the Scripture, foreseeing that God would justify the Gentiles by faith, preached the gospel beforehand to Abraham, saying, "In you shall all the nations be blessed." (Gen. 12:3) // So how did God work through Abraham to bless all nations? By sending His Son into the world as a descendant of Abraham; then Jesus \*lived for everyone and \*died for everyone for the purpose of saving everyone! Jesus' work is finished; we must receive Him by grace through faith!
- c. So then, those who are of faith are blessed along with Abraham, the man of faith. // Think back: The Jews had the law, which showed them how to honor God and hwhen they fell short, but the law was never given to save the Jews or anyone! "Men of faith are heirs of salvation, not men of works." (Kretzmann, 240)

## 3. Paul Tells the Bad News for All Who Trust in the Law:

a. <sup>10</sup> For all who rely on works of the law are under a curse; for it is written, "Cursed be everyone who does not abide by all things written in the

- Book of the Law, and do them." (Deut. 27:26) // If you want to earn your way to heaven, just keep all of God's law perfectly! BUT, since no one can do that, all who try are under God's curse!
- b. <sup>11</sup> Now it is evident that no one is justified before God by the law, for "The righteous shall live by faith." (Hab. 2:4) <sup>12</sup> But the law is not of faith, rather "The one who does them shall live by them." // Notice the division: Law is on one side live it perfectly and earn heaven! Gospel is on the other side believe in Jesus who lived it perfectly for us!
- c. <sup>13</sup> Christ redeemed us from the curse of the law by becoming a curse for us-- for it is written, "Cursed is everyone who is hanged on a tree" (Deut. 21:23)-- <sup>14</sup> so that in Christ Jesus the blessing of Abraham might come to the Gentiles, so that we might receive the promised Spirit through faith. // Since sin brings God's curse, Jesus willingly received our sin and God's curse. Now, through Him, we are redeemed we are back in God's holy family through faith in Jesus!

**Conclusion**: The Bible is so clear: We are NOT saved by what we do, BUT through JESUS! And all God's people said: **Amen!** 

**Response:** Let us **(1)** trust in Jesus alone for heaven; **(2)** feed on the Bible every day; and **(3)** help others know this essential truth: Trust in works = condemnation, but trust in Jesus = salvation!

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
